







## Ask An Artist David Wood | Painter

Just imagine what a dull place the world would be without art. But for most artists, making a living from their work is not easy – so why do it, why not just get a 'proper' job? This is the question we asked Cambridge-based artist David Wood. "I did have what you'd call a proper job – but I found the full-time hours took me far too away from where my passion lay. I still work part-time in arts administration (to bring in some money), but fundamentally having a regular job is not what makes me happy. Being an artist gives me the freedom to create on a daily basis – it's a need I have and the life I choose. It also gives me the time I need for my art practise. I follow author Malcolm Gladwell's advice in his book Outliers: The Story of Success in which he explains the '10,000-hour rule',

and how the key to achieving expertise in any skill, is, to a large extent, a matter of practicing the correct way.

As a representational painter, being mindful and observing the world around me is crucial to being an artist, allowing me to capture single moments, either of a particular time of day, atmosphere or a figure in action. Painting 'En Plein Air' (in the open air), is very much a part of my art practise now, responding directly to the subject, in the elements, creating a stronger connection between the subject and the art."
